Church History

When did family home evening as a church program start? *1915.* Joseph F. Smith inaugurated family home evening in an official letter from the First Presidency. President David O. McKay reemphasized the family home evening program, and a family home evening manual was published to support families each year from 1970–85 (see a Church News article on LDS.org titled "2015 Marks Two Milestones for Family Home Evening" at https://goo.gl/EC8V3U).

On September 23, 1995, "The Family: A Proclamation to the World," a declaration from the First Presidency and Quorum of the Twelve Apostles, was published. President Gordon B. Hinckley read the proclamation in the women's session of general conference in October 1995 (see Gordon B. Hinckley, "Stand Strong against the Wiles of the World," *Ensign*, November 1995, or online at https://goo.gl/LzYTwL. President Hinckley introduces the proclamation at 19 minutes 32 seconds).

Talk about what you like about your family. Talk about what makes you strong and what could make you stronger.

Study the doctrinal topic of "Eternal Families and Family History Work." Record what you learn and share what you learned with your parents or a priesthood leader (see pp. 18–21, 42–45, 66–69).

Look over the section "For the Strength of Youth: Family and Friends." Work on it, or review what you did if you have already done this section (*Duty to God*, pp. 79–83).

Activity

Have everyone write down their favorite things about each person in the family. Then have everyone share what they wrote. Talk about different things your family has done together that you've enjoyed. Make sure to talk about day-to-day things as well as occasional activities you've done. Tell your family that *what* the family does together isn't as important as the feeling of connectedness and closeness that everyone shares. Then talk about memories of big and little things that stand out—times when family members felt really close. It could be as small as a special moment during family prayer, or as big as a family trip. Look at family pictures together, either for family home evening or sometime during the week.
